Americans' Changing Lives - Wave 6

Founded by Dr. James House, the <u>Americans' Changing Lives (ACL)</u> study began in 1986, with a national face-to-face survey of 3,617 adults. Since then ACL has followed the same group of people in neighborhoods across the country for more than 25 years (1986, 1989, 1994, 2001/2002 and 2011/2012).

Picking up where Dr. House and others left off, a new ACL study led by <u>Dr. Margaret Hicken</u>, SRC <u>Social Environment and Health Program (SEH)</u>, was funded by the National Institute on Minority Health and Health Disparities. Dr. Hicken is an epidemiologist who has made substantial contributions to understanding the sources of racial health inequalities and is director of the U-M <u>RacismLab</u>. Her ACL6 study will build on the five previous waves of data from the nationally-representative study, to examine inequalities in healthy aging between black and white people in the US.

For this sixth wave of data collection, living ACL panel members (n=1,527) will be contacted by interviewers in the Survey Services Lab (SSL) starting in April through August 2019. Data collection components include a 75-min telephone interview and verbal consent for an in-home visit scheduled and administered by a 3rd party vendor (ExamOne). The in-home visit was added to the design as another measure of health in addition to survey data. A health professional will be responsible for the draw of a small blood sample and collection of other health measurements such as blood pressure, height, weight, hip and waist circumference. The ISR BioSpecimen Lab has prepared sample collection kits, in collaboration with CLASS Lab at the U-M School of Public Health who will receive the specimens. The Study Coordinator at SEH will monitor chain of custody for all blood samples. Follow-up reminder calls for broken appointments with ExamOne will be made by SSL staff.

Up to this point, the ACL study has shown how our social connections and neighborhoods can affect our lives and ability to get by day-to-day. Research suggests that our neighborhoods have an important impact on our health. The quality of the resources in our neighborhoods and surrounding area can impact how well we can accomplish our everyday tasks, how physically active we are, what we eat, and how connected we are to family and friends. All of these parts of our everyday lives can impact our overall health as we age, including our risk for such diseases as cardiovascular disease and diabetes.

With this next wave of ACL data collection, researchers will have over 30 years of information to understand how our health is affected by our neighborhoods, work, and social lives as we age. Through physical measures and blood collection used for DNA methylation analysis, researchers can begin to understand more – and get a fuller picture through <u>epigenetics</u>.



HANDLING **AFTER-HOURS URGENT** FACILITY REPAIRS

In the end, most likely you will "know" when something is urgent...

If you happen to be working in the building after core working hours, on the weekend, or if your supervisor is not available, please follow the action steps below only when serious facility issues occur <u>after "normal"</u> work hours.

<u>Call and Report</u> to University of Michigan's Facilities Service Center (FSC): 734-647-2059 or 7-2059 from a UM phone. Provide the Following:

- UM's building name: Perry Building
- Room number
- Description of problem
- Other

Examples of When You Should Call the University's FSC (7-2059)

- Water Leaks
 - Standing water of moderate-scale or active leaks including overflowing or running commodes
- Temperatures below 45F or above 85F
- Security
 - Exterior doors not fully latching
 - o Card reader on exterior doors not operating
 - o Broken glass
- Bats or other wild animals in the building
- Power Outages
 - Large scale one full wing or building wide

Write Down Work Order Number and Inform ISR Facilities

After a UM FSC call has been placed, please notify ISR Facilities. Provide as much information as you can about the event and include the Work Order number (e.g. 1234567-2019). Then, do these three things:

- Drop a note at the Perry Reception Desk

If further communication at the time of the incident is warranted, call and leave a detailed message for:
