A New Workshop on Interviewer Effects

In the last week of February, three staff members from SRO are attending a new workshop created by survey methodologists from five different universities, including the University of Michigan. The three-day workshop, "Interviewers and Their Effects from a Total Survey Error Perspective Workshop" is

being held at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and will focus on survey interviewers and their effects on total survey error. It will bring together an international group of leading academic, government, and industry researchers and practitioners for an intense discussion of interviewer-related research.

Topics include interviewers and their effects on any error source, issues related to study design and estimation using interviewer data, and survey operational issues with interviewers. One goal of this workshop is to create a stronger link between scientific research on interviewers and actual practices associated with interviewer field operations.

SRO staff members Margaret Hudson, Theresa Camelo, and Grant Benson are attending the workshop. Margaret will present a poster entitled, "Developing a Quality Control Protocol for Evaluation of Recorded Interviews," describing work that she has done with the QC Implementation team on the use of a framework for measuring how well interviewers adhere to General Interviewing Techniques. Theresa Camelo will present "Effects of Innovative Motivational Strategies and New Staffing Model on Interviewer Attrition: A Data Collection Year in Review." Maureen O'Brien was a collaborator on this work, which looks at motivational strategies - retention bonuses, organization gear, and other personalized recognitions – as well as a new staffing model in an attempt to minimize interviewer attrition. Grant Benson will be acting as a workshop discussant on two papers about using item-level timings to understand interviewer behavior.

Over the past few years, Lisa Holland and Margaret Hudson have continued to work with colleagues from the University of Wisconsin Survey Center on updates to current General Interviewing Techniques. Dr. Nora Cate Schaeffer from UWSC will present the theory and justification for these updates in "General Interviewer Techniques: Developing Evidence-Based Practices for Standardized Interviewing." This work provides the background for a related demonstration of the accompanying training tools under development by UM-SRC-SRO and UWSC, "General Interviewing Techniques: Developing Evidence-Based Practices." The intention is that upon their completion, these training materials would become available to members of AASRO (Association of Academic Survey Research Organizations). The annual AASRO meeting also takes place in Lincoln, Nebraska, immediately following this workshop. Patty Maher and Stephanie Chardoul will represent SRO at this meeting where these materials will also be available for review.


SRO Tips & Tricks (and Shortcuts!)
